



BRUCE COUNTY TRANSPORTATION & ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES ADOPT-A-HIGHWAY PROGRAM

TERMS & CONDITIONS

The Bruce County Transportation & Environmental Services Department's Adopt-A-Highway program has been established as a public service program to allow volunteers to collect litter along certain County Road right-of-ways. This is a means for environmentally conscious volunteer groups to make a personal contribution to a cleaner and more beautiful road system.

The Bruce County Transportation & Environmental Services Department enter into an agreement with the volunteer group to adopt a section of the County Road right-of-way and keep it clean. In addition, volunteer groups will be recognized by a sign posted by the Transportation & Environmental Services Department acknowledging their efforts.

Volunteer Group Responsibilities

- The Volunteer Group is fully responsible for the activities of its volunteer workers and supervision, or first aid services required by its volunteers while they are performing clean up services with the County right-of-way.
- The Volunteer Group will ensure that all volunteers receive the **Safety Guidelines/Covid 19 Measures for the Bruce County Adopt-A-Highway Program** and agree to abide by the rules stated therein.
- The Volunteer Group will inform its volunteers that participation in the adopt-a-highway program does not make them employees, agents or contractors of the County.
- The Volunteer Group shall obey and abide by all laws and regulations relating to safety while they are operating within the road right-of-way.
- Work shall not be carried out on bridges or other structures where there is an apparent risk of injury.
- It is the Volunteer Group's responsibility to pick up the supply box and road work signs from their designated Transportation & Environmental Services garage. All equipment must be wiped clean per Covid-19 Measures and returned to the garage at the completion of the clean up event unless an extended period has been granted by the Department staff.
- The Volunteer Group will complete the "Participation Record" for each clean up event and provide a copy to the Transportation & Environmental Services Department within 5 days of the clean up.
- The Volunteer Group is responsible for arranging the disposal of garbage bags and recyclable materials collected during the clean up event. Garbage and recycling can be brought to the local landfill sites for disposal at no cost.

Transportation & Environmental Services Department Responsibilities

The Bruce County Transportation & Environmental Services Department will provide Adopt-A-Highway volunteer groups with a supply box and road work signs. The supply box will have the following items:

- safety vests
- work gloves
- garbage bags
- recycling bags
- first aid kit
- emergency contact information
- flagging tape for large/hazardous items
- information regarding noxious weeds (i.e., poison ivy, giant hogweed, wild chervil and wild parsnip)

The Transportation & Environmental Services Department is to be contacted at least **48 hours** prior to the beginning of a clean up event to ensure supplies are available.

The Transportation & Environmental Services Department will install sign(s) with the volunteer group's information at the beginning of each adopted section of road right-of-way.

Modification/Renewal/Termination of Agreement or Program

The Adopt-A-Highway agreement or program may be modified in scope or altered in any manner at the discretion of the Transportation & Environmental Services Department.

The agreement will automatically extend without amendment from year to year unless either the volunteer group or County notifies the other that they elect not to renew for an additional period. Volunteer groups are required to send the County any changes to the volunteer groups information in a timely manner.

The County may terminate the agreement and/or remove the Adopt-A-Highway signs if it finds that the group is not meeting the terms and conditions of the agreement and/or are acting contrary to the guidelines of the program.

COVID-19 HEALTH MEASURES AND SAFETY GUIDELINES FOR THE BRUCE COUNTY ADOPT-A-HIGHWAY PROGRAM

To protect yourself while participating in the program, the County has established safety guidelines which are to be reviewed before each clean up event by all volunteers.

The COVID-19 pandemic has necessitated changes to routine and practices to keep volunteers safe and healthy during volunteering. Bruce County has implemented several guidelines outlined by the Grey Bruce Public Health that should be practiced before, during and after volunteering. Additional safety measures are also outlined to keep you safe while volunteering.

Covid-19 Health MEASURES

Are you fit to volunteer?

- All volunteers should perform the self screening tool available on the Grey Bruce Health Unit website before leaving their home

- If you are feeling unwell, please refrain from volunteering and stay home until fully recovered.

Preparing for volunteering

- Avoid traveling in large groups to and from the site. Wear a face covering if possible.
- Practice hand hygiene
 - Come equipped with hand sanitizer
 - Nitro rubber gloves are provided by the County; you are encouraged to bring your own gloves
- Wear a face covering
 - Face coverings must be worn when volunteers are unable to be 6 feet in distance from one another
 - Face coverings are provided in the volunteer box; we encourage you to bring your own
- Watch your distance
 - Plan your work for physical distancing measures to be in place
 - Be mindful of public using the area
- Bring a personal supply of food and drink, if needed and avoid sharing dishes and food with others

While you are volunteering:

- Wear a face covering when social distancing is not possible (6 feet)
- Wear your gloves whenever possible
- Use alcohol-based hand sanitizer following activities where gloves are not used
- Be sure to keep a distance of at least 2 meters (6 feet) between yourself and others
- Cough or sneeze into a tissue or the bend of your arm, not your hand. Dispose of any tissue you have used as soon as possible and sanitize your hands afterwards.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth with unwashed hands
- Avoid shaking hands or any other physical contact

Road Safety

Road safety is of primary importance in all Bruce County Transportation & Environmental Services Department decisions related to the Adopt-A-Highway Program.

Think Safety

- Always be aware of your surroundings
- Stay mentally alert
- Always work in daylight hours
- Do not work in inclement weather
- Stay clear of water hazards
- Display "road work" sign before starting clean up
- Never walk or pick up litter on the pavement portion of the road
- Watch for cars and other vehicles as drivers may not expect to see volunteers working
- Avoid overexertion
- Bring lots of water to drink
- Work in pairs or teams
- Stay alert for and avoid hazardous plants (poison ivy, giant hogweed, wild chervil and wild parsnip) and stinging insects
- Avoid horseplay while working
- Prohibit any alcohol and/or illegal drugs.

In Case of Emergency

- Have first aid kit available
- Pre-select the most direct route to the nearest medical emergency facility
- Know which road you are on and the closest intersection
- Always have a cell phone and transportation immediately available
- Contact the Transportation & Environmental Services department to notify them of the incident (519-881-2400)
- Complete the Injury Report Form and submit to the Transportation & Environmental Services Department.

Get Organized

- Discuss the clean up route - take note of any areas of concern, such as high traffic areas or locations where there is limited vision (hills, curves) for approaching traffic.
- Prepare materials - make sure you have all the tools and materials required to complete your task safely and efficiently.

Transportation

- Carpool to your road section to reduce number of vehicles parked on roadside
- Park parallel to the road
- Park on the same side of the road that you plan to work
- Pick up litter walking against the traffic. This ensures all participants are facing oncoming traffic and are aware of any potential dangers.
- Do not walk on the road or shoulder except when crossing the road.
- Drive to the opposite side when the volunteer group switches sides

What to Wear

- Always wear the personal protective equipment (safety vests and gloves) provided
- Participants should wear closed toe suitable footwear
- Dress appropriately for the weather
- Avoid use of headphones

Handling the Litter

- Never reach blindly for an item. Always “identify” the item before picking it up.
- Flag large items for pick-up and disposal by County staff.
- Do not jump or step on your trash bag to pack more in
- Volunteers must not handle hazardous litter. Objects containing corrosive chemicals (i.e.. car batteries) or objects that may carry harmful bacteria or disease (i.e.. dead animals) should not be touched. Mark these items with the flagging tape provided and contact the Transportation & Environmental Services Department for proper collection and disposal.
